5. Significance of the site, etc.

The first connection of the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration with St. Joseph's Ridge dates back to 1873 when the sisters opened the parochial school in St. Joseph's Parish. In 1895, the superiors of the Franciscan Sisters at St. Rose Convent in La Crosse became concerned about having land on which to produce food for St. Rose Convent, as well as for St. Francis Hospital. Mother Ludovica Keller and her Council preferred land near St. Rose Convent, but none was available. They therefore considered purchasing some land in the St. Joseph Ridge area.

They found property known as Pleasant Home Farm available for purchase from a Mr. Mehren for \$5,000 in 1895. The total acreage approximated 200 acres on the north side of the highway on St. Joseph Ridge. Legal description is contained in the records of the FSPA Archives.

That same year, 1897, John Miller of La Crosse was given the contract to build a convent on the property for \$6.400 for the purpose of providing accommodations for the sisters who would reside on the farm and supervise the farm workers. The structure which resulted is the subject of this nomination. constructed of stone quarried on the property under the direction of the stone mason contractor, Mr. Witte. The house consisted of a ground floor, two spacious upper floors, and an attic in which A 300-foot well was drilled by Ed a water tank was placed. Roessler who erected a windmill to pump the water into the tank in The following firms and individuals from La Crosse the attic. Gutzie and Stark Brothers, assisted in the construction: carpentry, Ed Schomer, stairways, the Taylor Lumber Company, door and window sashes, and the Tausche Hardware Company, the hardware fittings and the gutters.

The building was completed in early November, 1898, and dedicated on November 10 by the Right Reverend James Schwebach, Bishop of La Crosse. He as well as priests, sisters and altar boys arrived from La Crosse in horse-drawn carriages. They were greeted by a group of Rough Riders in uniform, the United States flag, and band music. A dinner was served to all those who took part in the dedication. The convent needed a name, and at the suggestion of one of the sisters, Villa St. Joseph was chosen.

Significance of the site, continued, p.2.

The house was to serve not only as a convent for the sisters who managed the farm, but also as a place for sisters to find rest, recuperation from illness, and/or relaxation when needed. As early as the summer of 1899, Mother Ludovica offered the faculty of St. Rose Normal School, as well as the teachers of the La Crosse parish schools, a vacation at Villa St. Joseph. About thirty teachers availed themselves of this opportunity between June 12 and August 23. At various times the postulants of the community also used the Villa for picnics and various forms of relaxation. As the years progressed, sisters needing a place to recuperate from illness spent time in the country where fresh air and fresh farm produce were available.

Approximately ten years later, between 1908 and 1912, the needs of the community necessitated more adequate living quarters and an addition was built on the east end of the original stone house. In harmony with the first structure stone was procured from the same quarry down the hill. The addition provided for a chapel and more room for the sisters of the convent, for the sisters who taught in the St. Joseph Ridge parochial school, and for the grade school children who boarded at the convent while attending the parish school. Steam heating was installed at this time, the total cost of the project amounting to \$12,000.

In 1939 and again in 1944, as the retirement and convalescent needs of the Community increased, two additional brick structures were built. The first is attached to the west side of the stone house. It is only the original stone structure, however, which is the subject of this nomination. It is interesting to note that the original purpose of the stone house - a convent for the sisters who supervised and did some of the farm chores mainly for the purpose of providing food for St. Rose Convent and St. Francis Hospital, evolved into a convalescent and nursing home for the ill and elderly members of the Community.
