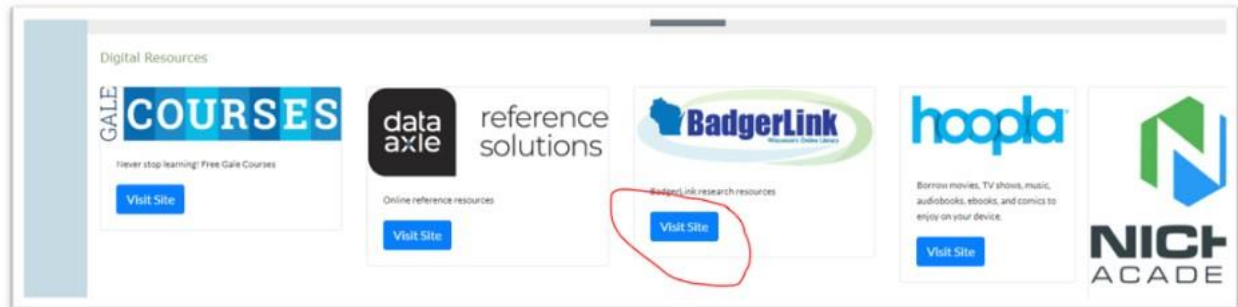


## How to Access Online Newspapers

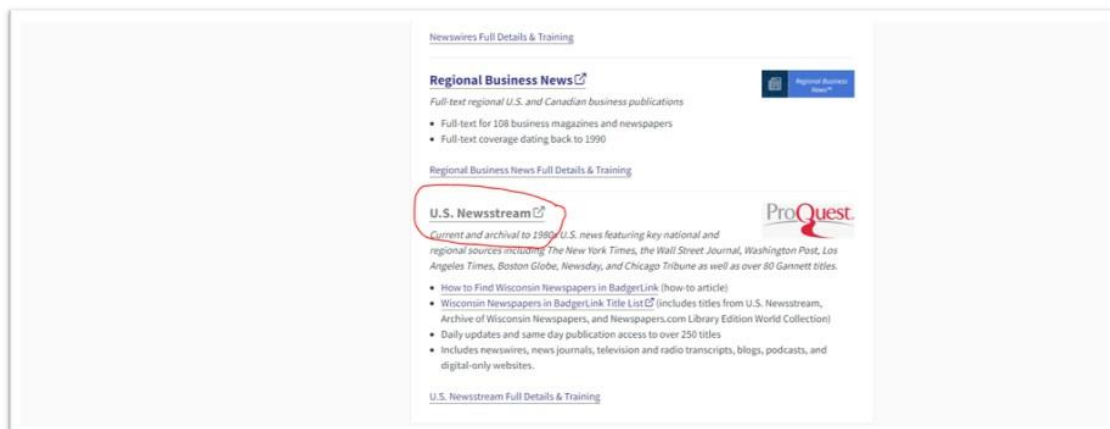
1. On the home page of our [website](#), click on the **BadgerLink** link:



2. Scroll down to Top Resources and click on **Newspapers**:



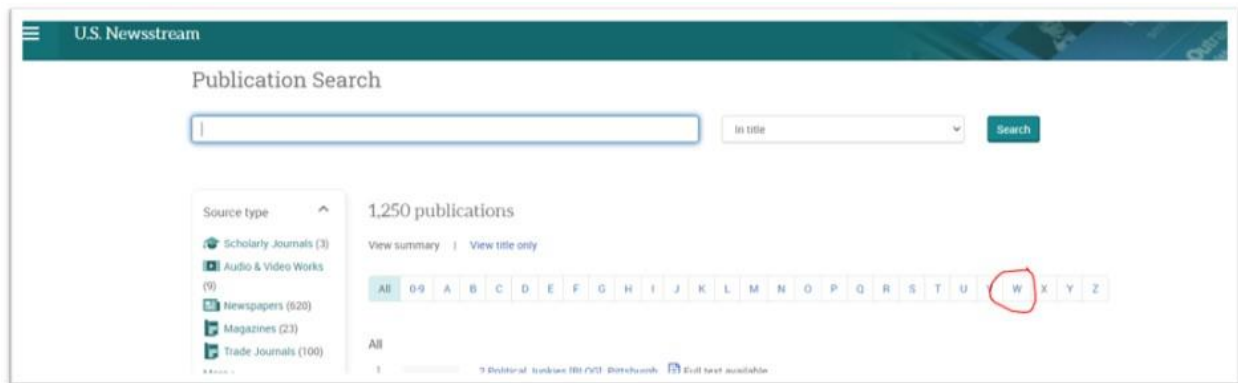
3. Scroll all the way down to find and click on **U.S. Newsstream**:



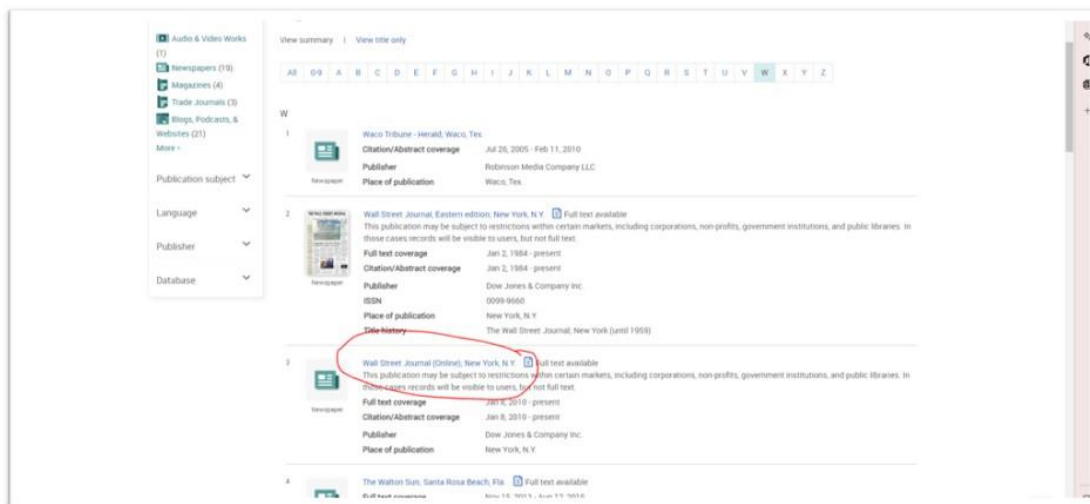
4. Click on **Publications**:



5. Click on the first letter of the newspaper's title. For example, for the Wall Street Journal, you would click on **W**:



6. Scroll down to find and click on the desired title. In this example, **Wall Street Journal (Online); New York, N.Y.:**



And **you are in!** Here you can see a list of articles from today's paper and you can click on any you desire. Today's date should be set but you can ensure you find the date you are looking for here:
